The KIRK DRAMA FEDERATION was formed in 1950. During the years it has done its best to foster the work of Drams in the Church, and as a means of fellowship. But such work is not just done by the Church of Scotland, and at the A.G.M. in November it was decided to find out the extent of interest throughout all Christian Churches in the Bdinburgh area. In March, in the Netherbow, an exploratory meeting was held, attended by many denominations, and following this, there will be an Extra-ordinary General Meeting in St. Serf's Church Hall on Wednesday 12th June at 7,30 p.m. to appoint Office Bearers and accept the proposed constitution of the new ecumenical organisation which seeks to carry on the work of KD.F. in a wider field, and not only with groups but with individual Christians who are interested in drama. NEW LOOK FOR KIRK DRAMA

AFTER almost 25 years in existence the Kirk Drama Federation will disappear next week.

For three days next week from Wednesday to Friday, drama groups from churches throughout Edinburgh will be taking in the Federation's final festival at St Serf's Church Hall in Ferry Road.

Although KDF are disappearing, a new Churches Drama Group are in the pipeline taking in denominations from all parts of Edinburgh. Al present the new group are known as the Churches Drama Association. Junual 121, 212 and 121

Mrs Kay Inglis, secretary of the steering committee of the new group, said: "We have held meetings with drama groups of other denominations and are ready to get this new organisation going.

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"KDF have been in existence for almost 25 years and gradually the number of groups involved has been diminishing but in our festival this year we will have two new groups taking part.

"Once the new organisation is under way we hope to take in groups not only from Edinburgh, but from the surrounding area. Many have praised our venture as a significant contribution to the examination of the commence of the comment within the churches," she said:
